Victims' Rights

The Intensive Supervision Program (ISP) is

An intermediate form of punishment that permits carefully selected state prison-sentenced offenders to serve the remainder of their sentences in the community rather than in prison. ISP is a “prison without walls.”

A highly structured and vigorous form of community supervision that involves extensive client contact, surveillance, restrictive curfew, and urine monitoring for alcohol and drugs.

A supervision program that mandates full-time employment, community service, and payment of court-ordered financial obligations, including restitution and Victims of Crime Compensation Office assessments.

An application screening process that selects only those inmates who have the potential to succeed in ISP and will not jeopardize community safety.

An applicant assessment process that seeks input from sentencing judges, prosecutors, police and victims.

Victims Have Rights in ISP

ISP is concerned about the rights of victims. Our collection policy ensures that restitution and Victims of Crime Compensation Office assessments are paid. Restitution is collected on a scheduled basis. No participant graduates with a restitution owed unless a payment plan is arranged with ISP. A judgment order is then filed with the Superior Court Clerk’s Office.

Opinions are solicited from victims regarding admission to ISP. All victims are invited to attend ISP eligibility hearings and make their position known to the resentencing panel.

Victims remarks regarding the application are always included in assessment reports. Victims often respond positively since admission to the program means payment of restitution.

Restitution is difficult to collect from prison. ISP participants are required to work so they can pay restitution.

Victims have volunteered to become a part of the ISP participant case plan. Victims serve as sponsors and/or network team members.

Collections

ISP collected over \$1,161,000 in restitution and \$30,000 for the Victims of Crime Compensation Office in fiscal year 2016.

Ways ISP Collects Restitution

- Wages
- Life insurance policies
- Selling of assets
- Voluntary agreement
- Judgment filed in behalf of each victim at time of discharge
- Disability payments
- Workman’s Compensation
- Income tax returns

ISP requires participants to address their court- imposed financial obligations, including compensation to victims, and enter into a judgment prior to discharge.

Victim Friendly Policy
